GOOD GARDENING

Topical tips for June & July

At this time of year the ornamental borders will soon be at their peak, and there will be plenty of early summer vegetables to harvest. There will still be a few jobs for you to do in the garden, and here are some suggestions to keep you busy.

- Deciduous shrubs that flower in late winter, spring or early summer need annual pruning to encourage strong, healthy shoots and improve flowering. Shrubs such as Forsythia, Philadelphus and Weigelia can be pruned now.
- Garden weeds can be controlled without using chemicals, so if they are becoming a problem in part of your garden try hoeing, hand weeding, repeat cutting or smothering. Non-chemical methods aren't just planetfriendly, they are safer to use around children and pets too.
- ❖ Water is a precious resource and supplies in the UK are under pressure from the effect of climate change, population increase and the need to protect the environment. Water in the morning or evening if you can, never in the heat of the day. It's good to remember, plants will use more water if more water is made available to them, so you can allow them to dry out a little between watering as they do not need to be wet all the time.
- Most garden plants benefit from dead heading, but leave those that produce decorative or bird friendly seeds and fruits, and those you want to collect seed from. It's best to dead-head flowering plants regularly, whatever the season, so remove flowers as soon as they begin to fade.
- Salvia is a great planting companion for roses because of its range of colours and long flowering period. Plus, the sulphur in the salvia's scent profile means that, when they warm up, they release a natural fungicide. Under planting with salvia helps keep roses mildew and blackspot free organically.

Here are some planting ideas to brighten your garden in June and July >>

Salvia nemorosa caradonna



A compact, upright perennial with purple / blue flowers and crinkled green foliage. Flowers from summer through to autumn. Height and spread 0.1 to 0.5m. Likes sun or part shade, and moist, well-drained soil.

Can be divided in spring or take semi ripe cuttings in summer. Pairs nicely with roses.

David Austin rose - Harlow Carr

A mid pink shrub rose, flowers freely from early summer to autumn. Old rose fragrance.
Excellent bushy habit with upright vigorous growth. Height and spread 90cms. Grow in sun/part shade, in moist, well-drained soil.



Dead head regularly and feed during the growing season with a rose fertilizer.

Why not visit Hyde Hall RHS gardens near Chelmsford during the summer to see their rose gardens?

COOKERY CORNER

Roasted Spring Veg with Watercress Dip

Try roasting your spring vegetables and make a peppery dip to accompany them!

Ingredients

1 shallot
400g watercress
25g butter
100g ricotta
1 lemon
Tabasco sauce
150ml whipping cream
300g asparagus
300g baby spring carrots
1 small bunch of radishes
300g new potatoes
2tblsp olive oil

Method

- 1. Chop the shallot and wash the watercress.
- 2. Melt the butter in large frying pan and the shallot and sauté for 10 mins, until soft.
- 3. Add watercress and cook for 5 mins, until watercress is wilted but bright green.
- 4. Tip mixture into a sieve and press down to remove as much liquid as possible.
- Return to the pan and stir in the ricotta and a squeeze of lemon. Season with salt and pepper and a dash of Tabasco.
- 6. Blitz the mixture in a food processor and transfer to a bowl.
- 7. Whip the cream until stiff and fold into watercress mixture. Leave in the fridge.
- 8. Preheat oven to 180°C/gas mark 4.
- Click off woody ends of asparagus, trim the carrots and radishes, cut the potatoes into wedges.
- Toss all the veg with oil and squeeze of lemon juice and season. Place on a baking try and cook for 45 minutes or until ready.
- 11. Remove the roasted veg from the tray and serve with the dip.


South coast in the lead-up to the D-Day invasion. On $\ensuremath{\mathbf{8}}$

Sadly, the most important piece of news recently is hearing of the death of John Robinson, one of Meesden's oldest and finest residents. John was a delight to talk with, as he reminisced about the old days in the village (of which he had an encyclopaedic knowledge) and life in general. Before he became ill, he would be out walking each day, and always had time to give to anyone who had time to spend. For many years, John's walking along the road through the village was one of the constants of Meesden life. He is greatly missed.



John Robinson 1931 – 2025

John and Lily's daughter, Julie, has given this warm account of her father:

"John was born at

The Fox pub in Meesden (now Fox Lodge) in 1931, moving to Rose Cottages when he was 5 yrs old. As a child John remembered that none of the houses had running water, so they had to fetch water from a standpipe on the village green. He went to school in the village hall, then later in Brent Pelham village Hall. During the war there was an American Air base at Nuthampsted airdrome, and John would often walk up there to watch the planes come and go. His mum would send him up there with eggs from their chickens to sell to the airman, and that is how he befriended some of the airmen, some of whom would be invited back to the family home by his mother Emily for tea. Years later, when the 398th squadron and their families returned, John would rekindle some of those friendships, even meeting up with one of two of them when he and his wife Lily holidayed in America.

John joined the Royal Navy at the age of 18, spending time in Malta, Cyprus and Japan during the course of his 7 years of service. He saw active service in the Korean War and in the Suez Crisis.

John met his future wife Lily, who was born in Anstey, in the late 1950s, and they were married in Anstey Church in 1960. They set up home at No 5 Rose cottages Meesden, and in 1965 their daughter Julie was born. John worked for J Sainsburys at their Buntingford depot for almost 30 years, retiring in 1995.

John was a keen gardener, with a huge vegetable patch that took up most of the garden. In his retiring years he also did gardening for other local residents, as well as keeping the common ground near Meesden Parish room clean and tidy. He also enjoyed assisting the local pheasant shoot, where he was a beater.

Ultimately John was never more content than when he was out walking around Meesden and the local area, chatting to other residents and enjoying the peace and tranquility of the countryside.

John was diagnosed with Parkinson's in 2023 and as his health declined Lily looked after John, until he eventually moved to Margaret House in Barley in Feb 2024, where he passed away on 6th April this year.

Lily and Julie would like to express their thanks to everybody who has supported them since John passed and are so very grateful for the lovely messages they have received."

Bill and Teresa Bartlet share their impressions of the village: "We are relatively new to Meesden, and Mike popped by and asked if we could write a few words as to how we are settling in. We wanted to say a big thank you to everyone in the village for making us feel so welcome. We are fully settled in now, and really enjoying such a peaceful village. It's hard to tear us away from the conservatory, watching the deer and the birds go by, but we are enjoying getting out walking our dog Spud and taking the grandchildren to see the many fairy trees and dens! We look forward to our first summer in the village."

MEESDEN'S NATURE RESERVE

The recent dry spell in April was interrupted by a short period of heavy rain, much needed by crops in the fields, not to mention our gardens! Since then, it has been generally dry with some warm spells, all of which has encouraged rapid growth of grass and other plants. As usual, the nature reserve, is showing its cyclical emergence of wild flowers. At the time of writing, the cowslips are past their best, but cow

parsley is just coming out, and buttercups, bugles and milkmaids look magnificent.









Milkmaids, also known as Cuckooflower, (so called because it flowers roughly when cuckoos first return to the UK), Our Lady's Smock, and May Flower, are the county flower of Cheshire. Its young leaves have a rather peppery taste, and can be used as a substitute for cress in sandwiches and salads. If you're passing the nature reserve, or St Mary's Church, have a look at these lovely flowers, and don't miss the stunning display of forget-me-nots beside the village hall.

Staying with a botanical theme, Andrew and Elaine McNeil write: "Summer arrived with intense heat that lasted for a week. Unfortunately, that is our great British weather; so unpredictable, but it keeps us gardeners on our toes. During that time, the blossom was looking beautiful, bees were busy pollinating

flowers and getting their nectar fix, and the joyful sound of birds could be heard. It did wonders for our well-being. Our plant sales at out roadside gate



started well; most are home grown, and with over 20 different varieties to choose from, hopefully you will find one or two for your garden. Remember, when you buy, you are contributing to the upkeep of St Mary's Church and NHS charities, particularly those for cancer treatment. So, happy gardening, be kind to yourself and others."
