GOOD GARDENING

Topical tips and ideas for August and September

August is traditionally the month for you to relax and enjoy your garden. Come September you can start to think about shaping your garden for next year, by planting new trees, shrubs, climbers and perennials. However, here are some jobs you can still do during August and September.

- Continue to dead head roses and give them a feed with a rose fertilizer. With milder winters, roses can still be in flower until late November.
- This is the last month for sowing salad crops outside. Visit your local garden centre to see what's available and you could be eating your own salad leaves until well into the autumn.
- * Keep watering your pots; never let the soil dry out completely. Continue to give the plants a weekly feed using a high-potash fertilizer to encourage them to bloom well into the autumn.
- Continue harvesting tomatoes as they colour up. Removing some of the leaves from around the trusses will let more light in, hastening ripening.
- The garden centres will start to stock a wide range of spring flowering bulbs. Now is a good time to start planting your spring flower display for next year.

Here are two plant ideas to add to your garden in August and September.

'Emma Bridgewater rose' from David Austin Roses

This is a new English shrub rose launched this year. It is a repeat flowering rose, mid pink in colour with a good fragrance. Height and spread 125cms. Likes sun or part shade. Good for a rose bed or mixed border. Now available as a potted rose or bare rooted (later this year) from David Austin Roses.



Clematis 'Bill Mackenzie'



This is a climber, has yellow nodding flowers and then wispy seed heads, which means it looks good for most of the year. Flowers from July to November, height 4.5m, spread 3m. Thrives on a north wall, or can be trained along a fence. Group 3, prune hard in late winter.

Why not visit Mentley Lavender Farm at Great Munden. They sell a variety of different lavender plants and products, have a coffee shop and run a variety of workshops. Check the web site for opening hours and details.

Proceeds were donated to the charities supported by the National Garden Scheme, Brent Pelham Church and the Village Hall.


WEDDING CELEBRATION, 10 JULY

MEET ROSIE, OF THERAPY DOGS NATIONWIDE

For some months, Rosie and her owner, Lesley Cross, have been going to the Lister Hospital, where they are always welcome. Rosie is one of many therapy dogs visiting the hospital, and both staff and patients look forward to her visits. Commenting on Therapy Dogs Nationwide, Lesley writes:

Therapy Dogs Nationwide is a UK charity, established in 2016 and managed entirely by volunteers.



The volunteers take their temperament-tested dogs into establishments to provide comfort, distraction and stimulation, enhancing wellbeing and promoting emotional support.

Rosie; Comforter to those who need a little support. (She's so cute!)

Therapy dogs visit schools to help children with reading, work with autistic adults and children, visit the sick and elderly in hospital and care homes, and work with corporations as part of their staff wellbeing programme to reduce stress in the work place.

There are currently about 2000 volunteers up and down the country. (Great work Rosie and Lesley!)

TREATMENT OF LIMESCALE

Improbably though this may sound, I have a tip for easy and cheap limescale removal. I have previously bought a propriety product for the purpose, which contained a mixture of phosphoric acid and various detergents, and which, to be fair, did the job, though often required multiple treatments. However, it got me thinking about the possibility of using citric acid, (the acid in lemon juice – I've since discovered it's been used as a cleaner for years!) as much of limescale is calcium carbonate, which readily reacts with this acid. As I had a pot left over from some experiments I was doing with my grandson, I thought I would try it, and guess what - it worked brilliantly! Below are 2 photos of our kettle before and after treatment. I simply added a little citric acid powder to the kettle containing about 15ml of water, swirled it around to dissolve the acid and left it for about 2 minutes.

I have also used citric acid to clean the shower tube and head, as well as the scale around our taps and plug holes in our washbasins. Citric acid is a 'weak' acid, so it won't burn if you accidentally come into contact with it (though it will sting if you have any cuts) and it is also very cheap. We bought 1kg from Amazon for £8.95 so we've got ...er... plenty, and we're happy to give you a free sample if you want to try it. If there is sufficient interest, we could start a Citric Acid Syndicate, where I buy it and distribute (e.g. 100g) to any who might want some!

KEN NEWSTED REPORTS FOR THE PARISH COUNCIL:

Our Parish Council would welcome anyone at any of their Parish Council meetings. We would love to hear any issues residents may have, and it gives you the opportunity to chat with our Parish Councillors and possibly the District Councillor Geoff Williamson, who often attends. The next two meetings will be: 7:30pm on Thursday 12th September in Brent Pelham Village Hall and 7:30pm on Thursday 21st November in Meesden Village Hall. Residents' issues are always first on the agenda, so you don't have to sit and listen to any of the formal discussions unless you choose to.

One thing that will be discussed at our next meeting is "should villages have an electric vehicle charging point?" You may have views on this - we would love to hear them.

DEFIBRILLATOR AND VETS

Please remember we have a defibrillator in our BT kiosk. The code for the cabinet housing the defibrillator is C159X. We also operate our Village Emergency Telephone System (VETS), which you can call on 01279 260560 if you need emergency assistance of any kind. It is important to remember that this does not replace the 999 emergency services in any way. The volunteer may not have any medical training, but they will help in any way they can.

LOCAL POLICING

Hertfordshire Constabulary's new messaging system, called Herts Connected (formerly OWL), is part of the Neighbourhood Alerts system. Registering for Herts Connected is a great way of hearing about everything our local police are doing to keep us safe. You can easily contact them if you have any concerns about your security, and can choose to receive free messages from the Police, Neighbourhood Watch and other agencies.

MEESDEN VILLAGE HALL

Under the VCSE Energy Efficiency Scheme the ongoing effort to make our village hall warmer by installing internal insulation financed by a government grant has unfortunately stalled. An independent energy assessment looked at the booking potential of our small hall, together with the cost of insulation, and decided it is not financially viable. Sadly, this ends this particular finance route, and we can only hope that other future grants could be of interest.

ST MARY'S MEESDEN SERVICES



THE WARD FREMAN POOL



The Ward Freman Community Group is a newly formed charity working to refurbish and reopen the Ward Freman swimming pool in Buntingford. We hope that many residents of Anstey and the surrounding

villages were able to talk with trustees and volunteers and see our designs at the Anstey Fair.

The pool was closed in December 2023 on health and safety grounds, with Hertfordshire County Council and East Herts District council being unable to afford the necessary repairs. As a charity we had been hoping to apply for a government Community Ownership Fund (COF) grant for close to £950,000. This would have enabled the charity to take on the running of the pool as a community asset for the benefit of the community. However, the general election halted any government department business. With a new Labour government and Angela Rayner shaking things up in the renamed Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government, we hope that by the time you read this we have more information on whether the COF still exists.

We still plan to apply for almost £950,000. This amount of investment will ensure that we



can refurbish and reopen the swimming pool to a high standard that will entice former patrons back and attract new ones, reduce the running costs and ensure the financial stability and future of the pool. We have been working with G2 Architecture to create a new vision for the changing rooms and reception area that will improve accessibility, visibility of the pool for spectators and create a café and social space with an opportunity for additional income. You can find more details about this proposed design on our website, where we welcome your comments on the design. www.wardfremanpool.org

If we are unable to apply for a COF grant then the plans will have to be significantly scaled back, with just the essential work taking place to safely reopen the pool. Refurbishment of the changing rooms and

reception will have to wait until the pool can generate its own income and slowly provide the upgrades it so deserves.

COOKERY CORNER

PUFF PASTRY PIZZA WITH BLACK GARLIC

My daughter-in-law visited the Isle of Wight recently and brought some black garlic back for me. I've sourced a recipe suitable for a summer picnic using the garlic!

Ingredients:

3 cloves of black garlic

1 red onion

1 yellow pepper

250g ripe mixed-colour cherry tomatoes

1 courgette

4 springs of fresh oregano

Olive oil

1 x 320g puff pastry sheet

Mozzarella cheese

2 springs of fresh basil

Thick balsamic vinegar

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas 4. Peal and finely chop the black garlic.
- 2. Separate the onion and cut into petals.

 Deseed and roughly chop the pepper,
 halve the tomatoes, and roughly slice the
 courgette, then add to a 25cm x 35cm
 roasting tray with the garlic.
- Sprinkle over the oregano leaves and drizzle with 2 tbsps of oil, season with sea salt and black pepper. Roast for 40 mins, turning halfway.
- 4. Remove tray from the oven and push the veg in towards the centre slightly. Cover the veg with the pastry sheet and tuck in the edges. Place back in the oven for 30 mins or until golden and puffed up.
- 5. Run a palette knife around the edge of the pastry to loosen, then carefully turn out onto a board with the veg facing you.

 Tear over the mozzarella and basil and drizzle with balsamic to taste.
