#### **GOOD GARDENING**

Garden Tips and Ideas for August and September.

Although August is the last official month of the summer it can also be the perfect time to enjoy your garden while it's still at its best. Here are some jobs you can do to keep the garden in tip-top condition throughout August and into September.

- Dead-head flowering plants regularly to extend their flowering period. Pinch off the faded blooms or snip back to the first leaf below the flower for a neater finish.
- Thoroughly soak drought-stressed plants and shrubs, especially newly-planted ones. Use grey, recycled or stored rain water where possible.
- Prune lavender once flowering is over to maintain a compact, bushy shape, but avoid cutting into old wood.
- Pinch out the tops of outside tomatoes as further flowers are unlikely to produce fruits that have time to ripen.
- Towards the end of September is a good time to plant new perennials, as the soil is still warm but the moisture levels are increasing. The garden centres should still have a good range of plants for you to choose from.

Here are some planting ideas to brighten your garden in August and September-

#### Aster x frikartii 'Monch'

A lovely blue flower with good mildew resistance. Flowers from July to October. A perennial plant that likes moist but well-drained soil. Height 60cms, spread 45cms. Plant in full sun and deadhead throughout the growing season.

It can be cut down after flowering, or leave standing over winter for the wildlife, as the seed heads are loved by the birds.



#### Agastache aurantiaca 'Morello'



A deep pink agastache perennial plant which soon forms a nice clump in the border. Flowers from July to October. Likes well-drained soil. Height 75cms, spread 45cms, plant in full sun. Deadhead throughout the season to

encourage more flowers. Plant can be divided in the spring.

Why not find time to visit other open gardens or nurseries in your area to see what else is in flower at this time of year? Nurseries and specialist bulb catalogues will also be getting their spring bulb selection in now, so you can start planning for next year!

We persuaded him that, with gardening, it's all about the journey, not the destination - maybe the punters would like to see that we struggle? We finally opened on Sunday 8th June, to catch the best of the roses.



We had really delicious Simmons cakes along with wonderful gluten free / dairy free offerings from Hazel, Decia and Helen. Many thanks to all of our helpers. Mike parked a couple of old cars outside the front door - an Austen Healey, an old Camper Van and a seriously eccentric bag of bits called a Fraser Nash. It was a real hit. David and Hazel added to the excitement with their beautiful old e-type Jag.

We were proud to welcome 319 fee-paying people to our garden, plus loads of children who came in free. 

## MEESDEN NEWS

Having just had two heatwaves close together, the prolonged rain earlier in the year seems only a vague memory, or was it even just my hazy imagination! Pond water levels throughout the village are now greatly reduced, and in some cases, (like the pond behind the nature reserve) it's completely absent. The recent very warm weather, however, has induced an almost synchronous appearance of a great number of butterflies, which should support greater numbers of birds like swallows, martins, wrens, sparrows and others, as well as frogs and toads.

In the nature reserve, orchids are now past their best, but areas of lady's bedstraw are out in all their glory.

Historically, the dried plant was used as stuffing material for mattresses, especially used for women about to give birth, as it was believed it would ensure a comfortable and easy delivery (!), hence its name. In the past, it has been used to treat a plethora of medical conditions, but with uncertain efficacy!

Andrew and Elaine (Alma Cottage) write: "Wow! what a heatwave this summer turned out to be. It pleased some but not all, particularly if you had to work. We found it difficult keeping all our potted plants watered and in tip top condition to sell at our gate, but managed to take a good selection to Meesden Hall for their open garden, which was a great success. Our natural ponds are nearly dry, so unless we have rain shortly the wildlife will suffer. We keep our birth baths topped up and put containers around the garden for them. A delight to watch was our sixteen new ducklings, from two mothers, becoming bigger each day. However, while we still had water, we were



treated to an aerial display of swifts swooping down and skimming the water to drink – very magical! Another good sign is the huge amount of ladybird larvae which on becoming ladybirds will eat the greenfly that are on our roses. Nature is such a wonderful thing, and we must do all we can to protect it.

There is still time to buy from a good selection of homegrown plants to fill a gap in your garden or give as a gift. Profits go to our village church and charities.



#### **MEESDEN BARN DANCE**

#### **PAVLOVA WITH EXOTIC FRUITS**

Pavlova meringue can be made a few weeks in advance and the filling added on the day you would like to eat it!

#### Ingredients

4 egg whites

8oz caster sugar

1 tsp vinegar

1 tsp vanilla essance

2 tsp cornflour

300ml double cream

3 tbsp Malibu liqueur

1-2 slices pineapple

1 medium mango, peeled,

1 papaya, peeled, deseeded, stoned and sliced

1 passion fruit, halved and sliced

#### Method

- 1. Preheat oven 130°C, Gas mark 1-2. Line a baking tray with parchment paper and mark out a 23cm (9") circle.
- 2. Place the egg whites in a bowl using an electric mixer whisk on high for approx. 2-3 mins, until stiff. Add a large spoonful of sugar and whisk on max speed for approx. 2 mins. Continue adding spoonfuls of sugar, whisking after each addition until all the sugar has been added.
- 3. Using a metal spoon fold in the vinegar, vanilla essence and cornflour until well blended.
- 4. Spoon onto parchment paper creating a swirled and peaked effect.
- 5. Bake for 1hr 15 mins. Turn off the oven and leave to cool completely in the oven.
- 6. Place the pavlova on a plate, discarding the paper. Whisk the double cream and Malibu and spoon into the pavlova, top with fruit and spoon over passion fruit seeds.
- 7. Keep refrigerated until ready to serve.
