GOOD GARDENING

Garden tips and ideas for October and November

After a very dry summer, gardens across the country have welcomed the rain which came with the start of September. In my own garden there have been casualties, which gives me an opportunity to look for new plants more adapted to our changing climate.

Here are some jobs you can be doing in October and November to prepare the garden for winter.

- It's an ideal time to take photos of each area to remind you of plants that did well and areas that need changing. This will help when ordering seeds and plants for next year.
- Lawns have suffered during the dry summer. Rake out the thatch from the surface and repair dead patches with either grass seed or new turf. You could also apply an autumn feed to the lawn.
- Re-use old growbags by cutting away the top and sowing late salad crops. Cropping can be extended into winter if grown under glass or cloches.
- Cut back any soft growth on perennial plants, but leave others if they have attractive stems or seed heads for the birds.
- Ponds are now in need of a clean-up. Remove the leaves and divide large pond plants, but keep an eye out for frogs and toads that might be getting ready to hibernate nearby.

Here are some planting ideas to brighten your garden in October and November:

Mahonia Volcano

An evergreen, compact shrub. Has yellow flowers in October / November that open to coppery orange

buds. The leaves are a soft silvery grey.

Height and spread 1m. Likes sun or part shade in well-drained soil.



Euonymus alatus compactus



A compact, spreading, deciduous shrub.
Leaves turning a rosy red in autumn. Small green flowers followed by red-purple fruits containing orange seeds. Height 0.5-1m, spread 1m-1.5m. Likes sun or part shade in well-drained soil.

Marks Hall Gardens and Arboretum in Coggeshall, Essex is well worth a visit in October to see the autumn colours. Who knows, you may be able to pick up an early Christmas gift for your gardening friends!

COOKERY CORNER

There are so many apples ripening now, with boxes dotted around the villages full of free fruit to enjoy. Use apples or plums for this easy pudding.

Ingredients:

12oz (350g) self-raising flour 1 tsp baking powder Pinch salt 60oz (150g) caster sugar 2 eggs 6 tbsp. milk

For the apple topping: 1lb (450g) cooking apples 2oz (50g) melted butter 2oz (50g) light brown sugar

½ tsp ground cinnamon

4 tbsp. rapeseed oil

- 1. Preheat oven 200°C, Gas mark 6. Grease a 27.5 x 17.5cm (11 x 7 inch) oblong baking tin and line with a strip of greaseproof paper, cut the width of the base and long enough to overlap the opposite ends.
- Stir the flour, baking powder and salt into a mixing bowl. Add the sugar. Whisk the egg, milk and oil in a second bowl, then pour into the flour mixture. Using a wooden spoon, stir to blend the ingredients, then beat well for 1 minute to get a soft cake mixture. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and spread level.
- 3. Peel, core and thickly slice the apples. Brush the top of the cake mixture all over with the melted butter, then arrange apple slices over the surface in neat rows. Sprinkle with the mixed sugar and cinnamon.
- Place in the oven and bake for 35 mins. Allow to cool in the baking tin and then loosen the sides and lift out using the baking paper ends to help.
- 5. Serve with warm custard or cream.

MEESDEN NEWS

Summer has officially ended, and to herald that event, on the first day of Autumn, we have had a lot of much needed rain. The ponds that were dry now have a thin film of water over them, and the natural world around us is probably breathing a metaphorical sigh of relief! Some trees have shed their leaves early and many have produced an abundance of seeds. There is a good crop of blackberries, whilst hawthorn berries and rosehips add a delightful splash of colour to the hedgerows.









All around, the fields have been harvested and ploughed, ready for the next cycle of sowing.

Commenting on farming and the harvest, Wilfrid Dimsdale writes;

"Unsurprisingly, harvest this year has been what can only be described as 'easy'. When one uses the word easy it doesn't mean disastrous, as was 1976 which really was easy. The barn then was not filled to overflowing.

This year, in spite of a record dry season unsurpassed since 1976, we had the benefit of a winter of grey skies and rain nearly every day. The weather's timing, from when the rain stopped, has been such that roots followed the moisture down as the soil dried. So, overall not bad, a little below average, however everybody's favourite crop, oil seed rape did surprisingly well, as did the winter barley. Wheat, not so, with the thousand grain weight lower than normal, indicating a lower yield but with good levels of protein. Farming on light land such as East Essex and Norfolk has been very hard hit, with livestock farmers having to break into winter feed.

Change has been as significant in the past fifty years as had been the previous fifty. Then farming was struggling with very low prices prior to the Second World War and the onset of mechanisation. A farm sold locally in 1929 was able to repay the outlay by selling hedgerow timber, there was no money in farming.

Then came mechanisation, led by the Ferguson tractor with Harry Ferguson, a Northern Irishman and his Ferguson system that, once an implement was connected, enabled tractor and plough to become one.

Crop varieties and their breeding have increased yields so ten tonnes per hectare are possible (nearly 4 tonnes/acre). Machines have replaced workers, 1,200 hectares (3,000 acres) can now be farmed with two workers.

Powerful tractors up to 360hp cover the area quickly, followed by the combine with its cutter bar that can be up to 40ft wide. A forty-acre field (16ha) used to take all day, now it's done in less than a morning."

MEESDEN VILLAGE GREEN

Rob Dussek writes on behalf of the Meesden mowing group: "We are fortunate in having a wonderful communal open space, in the form of the village green. We have the opportunity to enjoy this for our leisure, village and church activities.

Meesden residents may know that we keep the village green cut, during the season, by way of a volunteer group. I would like to thank all volunteers, past and present, for kindly giving up their time to mow. Particular thanks go to Steve Murphy. He regularly

mowed the green and also carried out the servicing and repairs of our mower, at no cost to the village. He has recently stepped down, so further new volunteers would be most welcome!

We are all becoming increasingly aware of the need to 're-wild' such natural spaces, to encourage pollinators, other insects and increase and restore nature. Whilst recognising that a nicely cut green can be pleasing to the eye, easy to walk on and used for events, we are mindful that residents may wish to see more of the green left un-cut. 
